Chicago, Chicago ... That Toddling Town!

Chicago, affectionately known as the Windy City, saw the first light of day in 1803, was incorporated as a city in 1837, sits proudly at the south west corner of Lake Michigan.

By the time the Great Chicago Fire devastated it in 1871, Chicago had grown into an industrial and commercial giant. Chicagoans showed great daring and resolve rebuilding their city with a daring in terms of architectural feats. After the building was completed Chicago boasted the world's first skyscraper, the 10-story Home Insurance Building (which incidentally still stands today).

As the century turned Chicago was once again a booming town. Engineers had just completed a project which reversed the flow of the Chicago River. In 1903 a fire in the Iroquois Theatre took the lives of 575. In 1915, the tour boat, Eastland, sank in the Chicago River. 812 drowned. During WWI industry expanded to meet the wartime needs. Thousands of Negroes were moved from the Southern States to work in related jobs. Prevented from living in most sections of the city, they were crowded into an old run-down

area on the south side. (Reportedly the area were Big Bad Leroy Brown came from).

In July 1919, a black youth swimming off the 27th Street beach drifted south beyond the limits of the black ghetto. When he tried to swim ashore, whites stoned him. The boy tried to swim back but drowned. This started the biggest race riot In Chicago history, raging for days, leaving 25 blacks and 15 whites dead, over 500 injured and about 1000 homes burned.

The passing of the 18th Amendment in 1920 (prohibiting the sales and manufacture of alcohol), speakeasies became a means for illegal access to booze and bootlegging. Gangs fought for control of bootlegging, gambling and other illegal activities. Gangland murders became common, reaching its peak with the St. Valentine's Day Massacre in 1929.

But the 20's were not just a period of violence. Among some of the artists of the time were poets Carl Sandburg and Edgar Lee Masters, novelists Theodore Dreiser and Upton Sinclair, and clarinetist Benny Goodman played in Hull House as a child and formed his first band in Chicago.

The Roaring Twenties

The Roaring twenties was an era that some of us remember with some wistfulness ... others with remorse and still others with some trepidation ... The years between 1920 and 1929 were years of change, torment, boom and bust for the United States. The Volstead Act declared that it was unlawful to drink intoxicating liquors ... anywhere.

It was unlawful to manufacture or offer for sale any but medicinal alcohol. It was like telling a child that he shouldn't touch the candy in the dish next to the television set. Tell an American he can't have something and he's going to want it all the more... and what's more, there are going to be people who will make sure that he can have it.

Speakeasies ... (the very word was coined for the era by Mencken ... sprung up in every corner of the country ... "Joe sent me," became a catchword. "The real stuff, just off the boat" was offered in garages, drug stores, candy stores, bakeries, nurseries, and some say, in police stations. Anyone who had a bath tub could go into business of providing bonded Bourbon for the masses. Fortunes were made overnight ... and lost by morning.

Naturally, none of all this was legal ... and so the underworld moved in ... and took over. The great crime syndicates that continue to flourish even today, found the

thirsty man a willing customer. The man who could "deliver the goods" was a "friend" of the mighty and the millions.—Such phrases as 23 skidoo ... Oh you kid, and so's your old man, were on the lips of college kids all over the country ... this was the era of the flapper, Henry Ford's tin lizzie, short skirts, raccoon coats, Whizbang, College Humor, Lindbergh, paper fortunes, and a nation feeling a post war prosperity that refused to stop.

Elevator operators were major stockholders ... a tip didn't mean a gratuity ... it meant hot information on a stock that was to be split on the morrow ... To quote Gershwin ... "The livin' was easy" ... and the music of the era was a mirror of the tempo of life in a throbbing, thrilling, pulse quickening day to day existence ... People danced the Charleston, the Bunny Hug, The Cakewalk ... a man named Valentino was sending feminine hearts soaring to the skies as he emoted on the great silent screen ... A nation sang "Lucky Lindy ... high in the sky" as a lone dare devil piloted a small frail aircraft all the way from New York to Paris ... non stop ... The nation went wild ... To this day, no one has ever received an ovation to compare with Lindbergh's triumphant ticker tape parade in New York. The twenties were indeed exciting. Punctuated with bullets ... hooch ... laughs ... tears ... and music that will live forever.




